Just the other day, my father sent me an obituary notice via email. It was the obituary of someone that I am certain that I met at least once, perhaps even several times in my life, but nevertheless it is of one whom I don't have any real memories.

Indeed, my only knowledge of this person is that he was the one to preside over my baptism, way back, when I was just a little baby, in the year of our Lord 1975.

The obituary states, "The Rev. George R. Turns out Pastor Knarr was a man who loved to travel. He enjoyed trips to Hudson Valley, NY, Quebec, Canada, the Bahamas, Bermuda, and Europe. He was a Yankees fan, and a Penn State fan, and a fan of the York Revolution (a baseball team). Pastor Knarr also enjoyed stamp collecting, ballet, opera, and symphonies.

As I said, I didn't really know Pastor Knarr, I only knew of him through a story or two passed down to me from my parents. Even so, I cannot help but feel a connection, small as it may be, to this man.

In the Apostle's and Nicene creeds, we have this particular line where we confess our belief in the "communion of saints." I have always understood that line to mean that we confess and trust that in God's gift of eternal life, we can be assured that there is a place where those who have died in faith are now alive and living in community together, and not only that, but that you and I (living on this side of existence) are part of that fellowship too!

I relish this image of what it means to be God's family; to be saints together in fellowship here on earth and in heaven. And in light of our celebration of All Saints Sunday, each year in November, when we reflect on and celebrate the memory of those who have gone from us to join the "Church Triumphant," I think it gives us much to rejoice over, and it teaches us something about the nature of being God's people.

You and I are connected. We are connected to every saint in every age. We are connected to those saints who prayed for us when we were sick or in the hospital, or who lifted us before God in the aftermath of some personal tragedy. We are connected to the saints who taught us the stories of the Bible in Sunday school and the saints who fought for human dignity in peaceful protests around the world. We are part of this vast and glorious family, saints on earth and saints in heaven, and even though we may never have met many of them, we are nevertheless connected.

In this month of November, as we remember the saints who lived among us as family and friends, we will take some time to acknowledge the ways in which they touched our lives

"All of Humanity"

A Commentary by Chris Gerace

In June of this year, I attended an LGBT+ "Pride Fest" event in Phoenixville, Montgomery County. I attended partly as a reconnaissance mission for the RIC (Reconciled in Christ) process we have entered here at Robeson Church, but I also attended to test my own mettle as a self-proclaimed "Christian." My attending this event was not without a small measure of fear. The fear however, was not of who would be coming to this event to support the LGBTQ+ community. With all the craziness and senseless violence going on in America today, any fear I had was that some loony or hate group might show up to deliver hatred or violence to this event. Luckily, nothing like that happened, and that fear did not "win" by preventing me (and many others) from attending this event.

The Pride Fest was held on a beautiful sunny day in an open, level park that was 1x1 residential square block in size. No different than a small town fair, the event consisted mostly of booths lined up in several "avenues," and a small bandstand with a seating area. A number of food vendors lined one of the street curbs offering all sorts of delicious lunch items, beverages and desserts. Most of the 50+ booths were of various organizations, not unlike one would encounter at a health fair or a police and firemen community event.

Booth occupants ranged from national businesses (Dow Chemical, Wal-Mart, Giant Food Stores, Pfizer) to local banks, Lutheran and UCC churches, real estate agencies, and other businesses. But about one third of the booths were staffed by organizations to provide education, support and assistance to LGBTQ+ persons, their families and friends, and anyone with an interest in helping the LGBT+ community. Represented were hospitals and medical centers, the Kiwanis, support groups, abuse crisis centers, and counselling services.

I visited every booth, gathering information, SWAG (freebies)



MINISTRIES AVAILABLE TO OUR SENIORS, SHUT-INS, SICK, ETC.:

CD Ministry—CD's of the weekly services are being mailed out to all those senior, sick or and shut-in members who cannot attend church services.

Large Print Devotionals—these are the same as our small, daily devotionals but have larger print for those needing it.

Home Visits—Our visitation team now trained to bring Holy Communion is visiting a number of our seniors and shut-ins and would be more than happy to visit others if invited. It is our hope to visit with and bring Holy Communion to each shut-in and homebound member of Robeson up to 6 times a year. and some contact information. All along the way, live music was drifting over from the bandstand stage from one of the scheduled musical acts. After visiting all the booths and talking to so many kind souls, I grabbed a bite, sat near the bandstand and listened to a good fusion rock band - with a transgender lead singer/guitarist - belting out some great original music.

Some of the overall observations I made during the event

The event was alcohol free and smoke free (smoking area set-up at the far corner of the square)

Everyone was polite, supportive, friendly and generous I heard no profanity, off-color comments or inappropriate conversations

Folks of all ages and whole families were present including small children

There was no parade, and no one was dressed in any shocking or inappropriate attire

I never - not one second - felt threatened by anyone at this event

I experienced no hatred or judgement, just a bunch of human beings lifting each other up

Pride Fest was a beautiful experience for me considering my upbringing. I was brought up in a Christian household. Although my parents never harbored any prejudice or judgment toward the LGBTQ+ community, I was also a product of my social surroundings. For me, homosexuals and lesbians were the subject of disdain and ridicule, and trans-gender people were considered all out freaks. All of these projections were made from a safe distance away from "those people." Oh, but how my mind has changed since those days.

I have already told many that I had a complete turn-around in the summer of 2003. At Robeson Lutheran Church, Pastor Sue Fox held a Sunday morning (summer time) Bible study regarding the ELCA's Sexuality Study. In one of those sessions, I realized just how wrong and how judgmental I had been for most of my life. None of that condescending or

judgmental behavior aligned with walking the path of Christ... and if we are Christians, then we are at least supposed to <u>try</u> to walk that walk. We should already know (deep down) when we are not welcoming, accepting, and sharing the Good News. It was like a light went on in my soul.

I am not proud of my past, and I chalk it up to being human. To this day, I catch myself thinking "That's so gay!" as a derogatory statement. (Bad habits of decades are very hard to shake!) But I would like to think that I have transformed, by the grace of our Lord.

Did you ever wonder why the ELCA Lectionary Calendar repeats the same scriptures every three years? My opinion is that it is supposed to get the message "through to us," to get the Lord's message to guide us, and encourage us over time to continue to transform from beings of the physical world, to spiritual beings in action i.e. true followers of Christ.

We are not put here on Earth to become set in our ways, but to transform. Doing the Lord's work (giving, welcoming, accepting, and sharing the Good News), transforms us throughout our short time here on Earth.

Please allow me to throw out a movie quote. Some of you might know what film it came from, others might look it up. It goes something like this: "...you look at someone long enough, you discover their humanity." Brothers and sisters in Christ, the LGBT+ community IS made up of humans. I realized that these humans have been part of humanity since the dawn of civilization, and they are no further a threat to humanity than any other demographic that has been sinfully repressed throughout history.

Now is the time to further the Lord's agenda. We must open our hearts and become beings of the Spirit. Transform. May we walk the walk as best we can, in the name of Jesus Christ - our Savor and Lord. Amen.
