

Indeed, it seems like every year we promise ourselves that THIS YEAR Christmas will be time for us to focus around the Christ child and the real meaning of the holiday, and yet by the time Christmas Eve rolls around we have discovered that much of our time has been spent at the altars of Amazon, or Wal-Mart, or the local shopping mall.

Maybe it's a seasonal addiction, or maybe we have simply convinced ourselves that gift giving is a necessity of the holiday season; after all, even baby Jesus got gifts of Frankincense, Gold, and Myrrh.

Now I don't want to throw out the gift-giving-baby with the bathwater and I certainly don't mean to say that gift-giving can't be a part of the holiday celebration. But in reflecting on it all, I would encourage you, my brothers and sisters, to join with me in seeking to practice greater wisdom in our gift giving behavior this Holiday season.

For instance:

Let's not purchase things that we really can't afford and end up putting ourselves into Credit Card debt.

Let's not believe the lie that buying something more expensive always means that the gift is more thoughtful or caring.

Let's not limit your gift giving opportunities with a store-bought only attitude. After all, there are plenty of homemade and creative gifts that can be just as nice, and even more meaningful to our loved ones!

And especially, let us not forget those folks around us who will be struggling with REAL NEEDS during this holiday season; dealing with the high costs of heating fuel, grieving over the loss of a job or loved one, or simply not having enough food, adequate shelter, or a loving family to celebrate with.

Hope for the "No-Hopers"

A new church year is again upon us. We began with the first week of Advent by "watching" and preparing for the coming of the newborn Jesus. This is also about the time of year that I renew my personal efforts in "reaching" my atheist friends and acquaintances, as one of my own personal missions.

In the last decade or so, I have become increasingly more concerned with atheistic viewpoints and lifestyles. I expect that like myself, most Christians at some point interact with atheists in their daily lives. Based on the many atheists I have met over the years, I have personally classified three types of atheist.

First there is the person who has never been raised with or around any religion or religious teachings. Second, there is the person who does not believe in any organized religion, or in God as our Creator, but may entertain the idea of a "higher power" somewhere in or beyond the universe. I guess that might cross over into agnosticism.

Finally, there is the person who has known religion, or in my personal experience, was raised Christian or learned *of* Christianity and the Word of Christ Jesus, but in their adulthood has outright rejected it. This third type is the atheist that most concerns me. I know quite a few of these atheists; I have tried and continue to try to reverse their rejection of Christianity.

Anyone who was raised as a Christian can arrive at a cross-roads upon reaching adulthood. Many decide to continue on their faith journey, but there are some who for a variety of

reasons will decide to reject it. While I can understand the atheist's perspective, I personally cannot imagine choosing a life without hope of something more than this world has to offer. Sure, they hope for the best life and may work hard to achieve happiness and security, but they have decided to set their sights only on the finite physical world. I know, it's all they believe in at that point, but how sad that they make no room for hope beyond this physical world. But I don't give up on them!

Throughout the year, I take advantage of timely moments when good things happen to them, to point out that they are "blessings from God." This usually annoys them but we somehow remain friends. My atheist friends are quick to point out the hypocrisies of organized religion — especially Christianity. They point out at how many different branches there are and how no one gets along or wants to work together. I try to cite the ecumenical work that many churches and pastors are engaged in, and they say that it will never be enough to bring all Christians together. Perhaps in that regard, they are correct. Perhaps that is a reminder to all Christians that this world is never going to be right. We Christians ought to renew our focus toward the path of Jesus, which by the way requires *effort* on our part to put aside our differences and walk that path *together*. But I digress.

Christians are like football teams. What!?!? Okay, please indulge me for a moment. We have the national league teams, then we have the amateur league teams, the college teams, and the high school teams. We even have corporate leagues and maybe just a bunch of players playing pick-up games in the park. The main objective in American football is to get to the goal line with a touchdown or a field goal, but basically to reach a "goal." Although Christians are of many types of denominations, sizes, locations, and we may have different playbooks, we are essentially striving for the same goal.

Meanwhile, you have your spectators, some of whom are

harsh critics. They happily tell what any given team or player is doing wrong, both during and after the game. My atheist friends like to tell me how messed up Christians are. We Christians do make mistakes, too often disagree, sometimes we have no interest in working together, and sometimes even work (play?) against each other. But at least we are in the game! We have our faith, and it is fortified by a divine hope... ...and *that* Hope is a powerful thing!

Hope allows us to lay our burdens before the Lord. Hope allows us to seek comfort and healing from the Lord. Where does the atheist go for comfort and healing?

Back in the 1990s, one of the security guards at my work place had served as a U.S. Marine in the Pacific theater of WWII. He was present at a number of battles including the epic battle of Tarawa. I'll never forget when he described to me the somber mood of the marines, aboard their amphibious landing craft as they approached the beach. He told me, "I will say this, there was not an atheist on that boat!"

We Christians have the Lord's gift of Hope, and may it continue to be strong and lift us up in this new church year. But we can spare a little extra hope for those atheists in our lives. We can pray for them, and continue (gently!) trying to be a positive influence on them. Hopefully, our Christian example might manifest in a change of heart. Amen!
