CHRISTIAN EDUCATION DURING LENT (2019)

Christian Education at Robeson continues to go forward for our children, youth and adults. For children we offer Children's Church during the worship services (7:45 and 10:15) for ages 3 through 6th grade. During this time the children hear a Bible story, do a craft or play a game and watch a video. The advantage of this format is that the parents are able to worship while the children are gaining biblical background on their level. On communion Sundays the children come back to the worship service in time to participate in the communion service. A children's message is offered on non-communion Sunday's before the sermon. Children are then dismissed to attend Children's Church until the worship service ends. <u>Youth 7 -12th grade</u> meet from 9:00-10:00 a.m. with Pastor Michael in the youth room, which is in Hoeffer Hall (gym). This group studies a combination of catechetical material, current concerns and other topics that interest the youth.

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL: Beginning March 10 and continuing through Lent the class will be using the material "Entering The Passion Of Jesus." This study looks at last days of Jesus' life and analyzes the risks and motives of the story's characters. EVERYONE is welcome to join the class which meets from 9:00-10:00 a.m. in the last room on the right in the education building.
